The Learning Menu and any written work should be returned to the classroom teacher upon returning to school. Not all assignments will have written work to return.

Log into IStation and complete reading activities for 30 minutes.	Practice addition and subtraction facts outloud with a parent or caretaker.	Choose a nonfiction book on the Istation Library, read and describe your favorite parts to someone.	Write by 1s to 100.	Help clean your bedroom or another part of your house.
Read a book to a stuffed animal, doll, or pet. Retell the story to your in your own words to your reading buddy.	Create an original schedule for a perfect day. Draw clocks to show the times for each event.	Say <i>The Pledge of Allegiance</i> at least once.	What was the best thing that happened today? What was the worst? Answer using 2 complete sentences.	Play a game (card, puzzle, board, etc.)
Practice your sight words using some of the fun ideas provided.	Log into IStation and complete math activities for 30 minutes.	Draw a detailed map of a room in your house and share it with someone.	If you could switch places with your teacher for a day, what would you teach the class? Write your answer in 2 complete sentences.	Play outside. Remember to be safe!
Find 10 words throughout a story, then list them in alphabetical order.	Count the value of a handful of pennies. Repeat for nickels.	Fill the sink with water. Predict if items will float or sink.	Help your family write a grocery list.	Design a musical rhythm or sing a song.

Fun Ways to Practice Sight Words at Home

1. Flashlight Words: Spread the cards out face up on a table, or tape onto walls, doors, or ceiling. Call out a word and have your child shine the flashlight on the word.
2. Go Fish: Make two sets of the word cards and play go fish.
3. Words in our World: Have your child look for sight words around the house or other places. Have them look for them as you read books together.
4. Concentration: Make two sets of sight word cards and have your child spread the words out face down on a table. Turn two cards over, read the words on the card, and see if they are a match.
5. Walking words: Lay the words in a line on the floor and have your child walk the line as they read each word.
6. Tic-Tac-Toe: Write words in the tic-tac-toe spaces. Take turns selecting a space to read. If read correctly, an X or O is placed on the space until someone wins.
7. Word-O: This is played just like Bingo. Fill in a card with the words that you are working on. Call out the words and mark the space until someone wins.
8. Coin Toss: Put words on the floor. Children take turns tossing a coin onto a word and saying the word. If they are correct, they get to keep the coin. If you like, first to 10 coins wins.
9. Beat the Clock: See how many times your child can write a word in one minute. See how many flashcards they know in one minute!
10. Salt Tray: Grab a tray or baking sheet with edges (meat trays work great). Pour in salt, rice, or flour. Write the word in the salt, rice, or flour. When your child says the word correctly, they get to erase the word (shake the pan).
11. Type the words on a computer.
12. Cut and paste letters from magazines or newspapers to spell your words.
